Update from the July Trustee's Meeting

Here are some key items from our last meeting...

We received the report from the quarterly meeting of our Investment and Planned Giving subcommittee given by Wynn Davies, chair of the subcommittee. This included the status of investments, checking accounts, and memorials. We had a discussion relating to accessibility issues – specifically door openers and ramps. The former choir room (aka Hearthroom, Helen C. Towner Room) has had the stage removed (thank you Wayne Bischel!), the floor tile removed, and is scheduled for carpeting.

- We are looking into ways to receive a better return and better access with our checking accounts.
- 2) We accepted the recommendation of the Personnel Committee (thank you Diane Adams, Brenda Lempp, and Coral Bishop!) to offer the position of Music Director to Youngjoo Hong.

Also, an update from a prior meeting – we have added our church to a list of participating congregations that can be contacted by the Dane County Office of Emergency Management if the need arises for emergency short term shelter due to weather events or other crisis situations.

FROM THE BOARD OF OUTREACH

Summer Offerings



Our 2023 One Great Hour of Sharing and America for Christ offerings are drawing to a close. These offerings support ministries of the American Baptist denomination.

As of August 1, we have received \$5,430 for the One Great Hour of Sharing offering and \$3,095 for the America for Christ offering. THANK YOU!

Your Outreach Budget at Work: Allied Partners

Allied Partners (http://alliedpartners.madisonwi.us) is a collaboration of congregations and organizations who share a vision of a strong and healthy community in the Allied Dunn's Marsh neighborhood. Board of Outreach member Wynn Davies volunteers as their Treasurer. The Board of Outreach's 2023 budget includes \$2,000 for Allied Partners; and \$1,000 of that budget has been spent to date. Of course, FBC's budget just contributes to cover some of their expenditures. Here is a brief report on a few of their activities.

Eviction Fund

There were four situations during June that they were able to support from this fund:

- A man whose hours were cut back fell behind in his utility payments. MG&E threatened to cut off his utilities unless \$500 was paid on the outstanding bill. Funds from Eviction Fund were provided.
- A woman who had surgery and had to take time off from work to heal. Consequently, she fell behind in her rent, and \$500 was paid to help.
- A woman who applied for disability relief because she found it difficult to maintain employment. As a result, she fell behind in her rent, and \$500 was paid to help.
- A woman whose newborn son was hospitalized with pneumonia lost work hours caring for him and fell behind in her rent, and \$500 was paid to help.

These are typical stories that provide insight into the lives of people in this community — often minorities who are employed in non-living wage jobs that enable them to live only paycheck to paycheck until life throws them a curve. Thank you First Baptist for being there to help some of them avoid the disaster of homelessness.

Special Projects Fund: \$400 were used to support the Allied Food Fresh program of Allied Wellness Center. This initiative provides nutritious food boxes each Friday to Allied neighborhood residents who live in this "food desert" where there are few grocery stores and limited means of transportation.

Allied Partners work with members of the Allied neighborhood and with service providers to support the neighborhood's physical and economic health, sustainability, and the common good. Those are a few examples of how our budgeted funds are being combined with the donations of others in outreach to the residents in that southwest side neighborhood.

Other Outreach Activities by FBC Volunteers

First Baptist is active in so many ways to reach its mission to "follow Jesus by doing justice, loving people, and advocating for equity". Here are a few examples from the last two months.

- Up to ten FBC members volunteered at Second Harvest in June and July to prepare food boxes for food pantries and programs in southern Wisconsin. They composed and sang a Second Harvest Pep Song when they volunteered on July 21. If interested in volunteering, contact Wynn Davies.
- Jill Thomas, Lynette Miller and Katie Dean provided meals for the <u>Healing House</u> in June. Meals are provided quarterly. More volunteers would be great!
- With the encouragement of the Wisconsin Council of Churches, members of our congregation signed petitions for restoration of the Brothertown Nation as a federally-recognized tribe.
- First Baptist joined other faith groups to cosponsor a press release from Wisconsin Faith Voices for Justice to ask President Biden for a just immigration system. Members of the Board of Outreach represented First Baptist at the press conference on July 19 at Orchard Ridge UCC.
- First Baptist was also a co-signer of an open letter to urge an end to political, civic, and religious hate speech against the LGBTQ+ community. First Baptist hosted the associated press conference on June 28.
- The congregation was invited to give to the America for Christ and the One Great Hour of Sharing offerings that support the work of our American Baptist denomination as well as responding to disasters and developmental needs throughout the world.
- A \$1,000 donation was made to the OWN IT Fund to support grants and education classes to enable more home ownership by the Black and brown communities (see article in this Visitor).
- In coordination with North Shore Baptist Church, \$192 was used from the Board's Special Opportunities Fund to purchase requested women's and men's running shoes, and baby

- wipes for the Immigrant Rapid Response in Chicago, Illinois.
- A donation of \$100 was made for co-sponsorship of the second annual Interfaith Pride Service on Monday, August 21, at Bethany United Methodist Church.
- A registration fee of \$50 was paid for participation in Madison's annual official Magic Pride Festival put on by the OutReach LGBTQ+ Community Center. Bill Beaudreau is organizing First Baptist's participation in the festival on August 20.
- The Green Team organized a tour of the Dane County Landfill in July to help people understand the importance of caring for our environment.



First Baptist Contributes to "OWN IT"

A Wisconsin State Journal article on July 3 pointed out that Madison has had some of the starkest housing disparities in the nation. According to the 2021 American Community Survey from the U.S. Census Bureau, the homeownership rate for white residents was 63% and only 20.9% for Black residents. Reasons for this finding include disparities and discrimination in health care, housing, education, and more that created wealth and income gaps for people of color thereby making it difficult to afford the high cost of housing.

The OWN IT Building Black Wealth program is a collaboration among Madison-area professionals in the real estate, banking, and financial industries. Its mission is to empower, educate, and guide Black and Brown families in building wealth through education and real estate ownership. Participants in the program attend courses to improve their financial literacy and understanding of home ownership. Upon completion of the education phase of the program, they become eligible for a \$15,000 grant that they can use toward the purchase of their first home. One City Schools acts as the fiscal agent for this pilot program. Families attending this charter school can participate in the program, 85% of whom are families of color. Members of the One City School staff can also participate. More details about the program can be found at https://ownitbbw.com/.

After collaborating with the FBC Racial Justice Team at a recent meeting of your Board of Outreach, it was decided to allocate \$1,000 from our Outreach Budget to this effort addressing an important issue within Madison's minority communities. A generous contribution from an FBC member matching the allocated, budgeted amount increased FBC's contribution to \$2,000. This is an example of our efforts to help members of the "Other Madison" to overcome the systemic barriers to achieving more stable and rewarding lives. Keeping Informed

What follows below is a press release for a press conference on July 19 at Orchard Ridge United Church of Christ.

Faith Community Calls for a Just and Humane Immigration System

When President Biden ran for office, he promised to make the immigration system fair, orderly and humane. He said he wished to "undo the moral and national shame of the previous administration." On his first day in office, he announced sweeping plans to reform decades-old U.S. immigration laws.

But two years later little has changed. Migrants still daily risk death from any number of dangers—lethal exposure to excessive heat or cold, drowning trying to cross rivers, suffocation in semi-trailers, falls from the border wall, outright homicide, and now detention center disasters. Of those who reach here, the vast majority face denial of entry—or even worse, family separation.

Largely because of a lack of good faith efforts on the part of the Republican Congress and a conservative Supreme Court, the President has only been able to deal with this issue via Executive Orders, but even those have disappointed immigrant advocates. He now has finally ended the oppressive Title 42 policy, but the situation at the border continues to be dangerous and untenable for the thousands of migrants trying to enter the US. The UN has criticized Biden's replacement of Title 42 with Title 8 as a violation of international law:

"Barriers preventing people from exercising the fundamental human right to seek asylum are unacceptable and contrary to States' international obligations. The new US Government Rule that restricts access for asylum-seekers who arrive irregularly after transiting through another country is incompatible with principles of international refugee law," said the United Nation's Refugee Agency and International Migration Organization in a joint statement.

In a very real sense, our immigration system is not "broken," as we so often hear. It is doing the job our politicians want it to do quite well, namely, to discourage all but the most "desirable" immigrants from even trying to come to the U.S. This despite the fact that our economy runs on immigrant labor, including the undocumented, who lack "papers" but are willing to do the jobs U.S. citizens are not.

We could speak further of all the many contributions immigrants have always made to this nation and the fact that they pay taxes, replace our aging workforce, create small businesses, etc., but that is not our purpose in this letter. Rather it is simply to remind people of faith – all faiths – that all religions teach us that all people are siblings to us, no matter their race, nationality, or economic status. Clearly, this is not the way we should be treating other members of our human family. We are not calling for "open borders" – no country is bound to accept all those who wish to resettle there to the point its social and economic life is jeopardized. But people also have a right to migrate, and all, migrants and natives, are equal in God's eyes. We are calling for a system that is humane, and for the U.S. to live up to the international agreements it has been part of for decades.

We call upon our leaders to think about the common good, instead of viewing immigration as a useful "wedge" issue, and we call upon our citizens to reject the politics of fear and demonization and call upon our elected officials to do the same. Lastly, we call upon all faith communities to respond to this moral crisis and become even stronger advocates for our immigrant families.

MUSIC ADVISORY SUB-COMMITTEE

FBC's Vast Collection of Choir Music



Dear Members & Friends of FBC:

The Music Advisory Sub-Committee of the Board of Trustees was asked to evaluate and make recommendations for our church's music inventory

which, in part, includes equipment and choral collections. After extensive review of FBC's vast collection of choir music, we have identified approximately half that we recommend either finding a new home for or discarding due to it being:

- 1) in a state of falling apart, literally;
- 2) uncomfortably outdated or with archaic themes or language; or
- 3) quite complex and meant for much larger choirs than FBC will have in any foreseeable future.

All music we recommend discarding is still available in the event you or anyone you know might like a copy (or multiple copies). At the end of August, any music not requested will be sent to recycling.

FROM FBC'S BOOKKEEPER

Financial Report as of June 30

The June financial reports have been provided, but they are out of balance by \$10.48. The bank statements all balance. The budget report shows the surplus of \$954.86, but with all the balances of the other funds entered (including moving part of the BMO checking account balance to cover the amount for the Designated Fund), the Operating Fund shows assets of \$1,189.66 and liabilities of \$224.32, for a balance of \$965.34, which is \$10.48 more than \$954.86.

Similarly, when I enter the amounts under Net Assets, using \$954.86 for Operating (and which is displayed at the bottom as Current Period Changes to Net Assets), and \$594,485.96 as Dedicated Accounts, as the 798 Offset Designated Gifts amount, the Journal Entry is off by \$10.48, so I had to enter \$594,475.48 (i.e., \$10.48 more) to make the Journal Entry Balance.

The year is 50% over, and income is 51.49% of the annual Budget amount, while expenses are at 51.19% of the annual Budget amount, giving a \$954.86 budget surplus year to date. Repairs & Maintenance had a large expense this month to replace a burned-out fire alarm panel (thus my request to transfer funds from the Capital Reserve), but in July we received reimbursement from our insurance company for most of that expense. I remitted the \$3,000 in the 21200 One Great Hour of Sharing and \$550 in the 21201 America for Christ accounts to ABC as they were quite large, but so far in July we've received over \$2,000 more in each of those accounts.

Green Corner Home Cooling Tips

The recent heat wave here in the Madison area has me interested in Home Cooling Systems. I've discovered several Cooling Tips from Energy Saver, a part of the US Department of Energy.

- > Set your programmable thermostat as high as is comfortable in the summer and raise the setpoint when you're away from home.
- Clean and replace filters on air conditioners once a month or as recommended.
- Turn off the kitchen, bath, and other exhaust fans within 20 minutes after you are done cooking or bathing. When replacing exhaust fans consider installing high efficiency, lownoise models.
- > During summer, keep the window coverings closed during the day to block the sun's heat.
- Select energy-efficient products when you buy new cooling equipment.

Also, *Energy Star* has a section on Fans for Cooling. This link describes the benefits and uses of a whole host of fans.

These fans create a wind chill effect that will make you more comfortable in your home, even if it's also cooled by natural ventilation or air conditioning.


