Announcing This Year's Advent Series



"Christ was born into a weary world. King Herod ruled the land with a legacy of ruthlessness. The Romans treated the people of Israel with contempt, imposing harsh taxes and land seizures that forced many into subsistence farming. Poverty and destitution were pervasive. And yet, Christ was born, bringing good news of great joy for all people.

As Advent comes again to a weary world, we ask, 'How does a weary world rejoice?' From the opening chapters of Luke's Gospel, we have found a few answers: we acknowledge our weariness, we find joy in connection, we allow ourselves to be amazed, we sing stories of hope, we make room, we root ourselves in ritual, and most importantly, we trust our belovedness. In the parallel birth stories of Jesus and John, joy arrives—despite trepidation, fear, or grief. In these stories, we find rhythms for rejoicing. As we move through our series, we hope to create space for acknowledging the weariness of our world while celebrating God's closeness with great joy.

And so, this Advent, we will hold space for our weariness and our joy. We will seek a 'thrill of hope' in our hurting world. We will welcome joy—even if, like the prophet Isaiah, we cry out for comfort (Isaiah 40:1). In this weary world, may we find many ways to rejoice."

2024 Stewardship Season



"Rooted in Faith & Rooted in Community" makes me think of a tree that is solidly situated in the soil with branches reaching out. The particular tree in my vision is not a single tree alone in a field. Instead, it is part of a forest. That forest is our church.

As a follower of Jesus, I have roots, but my faith is vulnerable to extreme weather. Our world is experiencing a lot of that. Tough times nurture anxiety, cynicism, weaknesses, and blind spots. By joining a community of believers, my faith is made stronger. Encouraged by others, I find time to talk and listen to God. I feel connected to a common cause and often find myself being challenged and inspired to consider different faith perspectives. It is life enriching to be a "tree" in a "forest" of Christians that is diverse in age, race, sexual or gender expression, and economic status. Collectively, our church's roots and branches extend deeply into the broader community. Our mission is to take a faith-based message of justice, love and equity to our neighborhoods, city, state, country, and world.

Our church has deep roots, and after the difficult time of COVID, there are signs of new growth. We have been a welcoming and affirming church since 1992, and our church's voice in the larger community as a faith-based support for the LGBTQ+community has never been stronger. Our Racial Justice Team is providing us with leadership to examine our own biases and become a more antiracist church. Our worship team plans Sunday morning services that are inspiring and relevant. We sponsor social events, meals, and groups for making

new friends and finding support. Our Outreach Board has identified a score of community organizations that align with our mission to bring justice and resources to the most vulnerable among us.

The attached budget offers a vision for the coming year. It is a proposal and a road map. Because we believe in supporting our staff, personnel costs are a little less than 50% of the budget. Building costs are less than 30%. Our Outreach Board has challenged us to distribute almost 20% of our income to community organizations. We are also proposing increases for initiatives related to Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging. If you are concerned about the deficit, rest assured that there will be a time set aside, after all the pledges are in, when the Church Leadership Council will reconcile our projected expenses with our projected income. In the end we will have a balanced budget.

There are many ways to offer support to the church. Wherever you are in life, what are you doing to live out God's plan? How do your thoughts, actions and words show God's love? How does making a financial pledge to the church fit in with everything else? If you have not pledged money to the church in the past, we hope that you will consider doing so. If you pledged last year, we encourage you to increase your commitment by 5% if you are able. With new pledges and increased pledges, we can continue to grow a church "Rooted in Faith & Rooted in Community".



FROM THE RJT AND PRC

What We Talked About

On Sunday, October 22nd, we completed a very successful session of "Let's Talk", to learn about ourselves and about FBC as we continue our work on race. This session was organized jointly by the Racial Justice Team (RJT) and the Pastoral Relations Committee (PRC), to begin taking the "pulse" of our congregation around racial justice. After sharing a meal together, we organized into tables of 6-7, reviewed DEIB principles (diversity, equity, inclusion and belonging) and then shared our thoughts on a series of related questions - our feelings about implementing this practice into our church functions, our vision on how we might accomplish that, and how it would be different from the present. We had good attendance, with 44 people attending, both in person and on-line. We had a variety of age groups, racial make-up, and both long term members as well as newer, young attendees. Discussions covered a wide variety of responses and suggestions, so a general summary of the table conversations are as follows:

There were many who had little or no knowledge of DEIB but there were as many who were somewhat familiar or more experienced with DEIB and a very small number who were very knowledgeable. General inexperience with this concept is indicative that we need more education.

There was a full range of **emotions** that arose when considering the implementation of DEIB into FBC, including:

Happy/hopeful (to begin the process), sad/impatient/angry (that we hadn't begun sooner), confused/anxious (how do we begin?), skeptical/uncertain/feeling ill-equipped (can we really be effective? Do we know how to meet the needs of people of color?), positive (looking forward to the work), uncomfortable (with difficult conversations), and curious (what will our racial justice work entail?)

Discussion of the **vision** for the future of DEIB at FBC included the hope to build on what we have

already done to achieve a more diverse congregation, including leadership roles, conscious efforts to make the church more welcoming to people of color, finding opportunities to build diverse relationships, opening the pulpit to more Black preachers/teachers, and having a variety of music styles. Many questioned whether our church is comfortable for people of color, that we can improve on having more outward signs to make the experience more welcoming.

Overall, there was a sense of interest, curiosity, and engagement within the discussions. Two common threads among many participants were the knowledge and appreciation of DEIB, but the feeling that it is difficult to incorporate, and the observation that our worship services are quite "rigid", which may alienate people of color. It was suggested that as a white church, we may be content and complacent with the way things have been, although showing signs of positive change through Pastor Tim's leadership. The discussions were rich and honest, a good beginning to work towards racial justice. indicative that there is a real interest and commitment to begin walking this path together. We have made progress, but there is still much work to be done.

"Let's Talk"—Apology and Appreciation

I recognize there were those of you who were interested in participating virtually in the October 22, 2023, "Let's Talk" session. While the Zoom link was provided in the October *Visitor*, it wasn't provided again on the 22nd. Please accept my heartfelt apology for that oversight. You and your voices were missed. There is information about the discussions in this Visitor. The discussion questions are here if you would like to reflect on them.

- 1. How familiar are you with the practice of Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging (DEIB) on a scale of 1-5 (I am not familiar at all...I am very familiar)?
- 2. What are three feelings that come up when you think about implementing/bringing the practice of DEIB into FBC?
- 3. Let's all take 1 minute to come up with as many examples of DEIB, as it relates to race, that we might put into practice at FBC. OR What is 1 part of your vision of DEIB, as it relates to race, at FBC? What is 1 thing that might need to change at FBC to realize this vision?
- 4. Overarching questions: What would your vision be of a Diverse, Equitable, Inclusive, Belonging FBC, particularly as it relates to race? How would it be different from the present?

While I realize it's not the same as engaging in conversations, you are welcome to provide your feedback to me, and we will update our summary to include that. I apologize again for the oversight.

In addition to apologizing, I would like to express my appreciation to all the PRC and RJT members who worked to bring this "Let's Talk" session to fruition. We extend special thanks to the kitchen crew who have a great system of setting up, serving and cleaning up. We were grateful to those of you who invested your time and energy by attending and engaging. There were many of you who not only engaged in the conversations, but also helped break the room back down! What a caring community!

That "Let's Talk" session was just a start. The work is not done for us as individuals or as a church. Please take time to reflect on DEIB in terms of your own life and join us in future endeavors to make it more of a reality at FBC.

After "Let's Talk", What's Next?

We've had that session, so now what do we do? While there's work for us to do as a church regarding DEIB, there's also work for us to do as individuals. After all, individuals make up the church! The church is in the midst of determining how we move forward. Here are some thoughts about how we can move forward individually.

The Racial Justice Team hosted a book study of <u>The Color of Compromise</u> by Jemar Tisby in 2022. You may or may not have read the book and participated. I encourage you to read or reread the book. It does provide a comprehensive look at "the American church's complicity in racism." That complicity still exists. Racism still exists and is even found in places as "welcoming and affirming" as First Baptist Church. For example, over the course of FBC's history, have African Americans been considered for pastoral positions? Do we regularly solicit bids from African American vendors for church projects?

Ibram X. Kendi offers some definitions of racism in his book, <u>How to be an Antiracist</u>. "Racism is a marriage of racist policies and racist ideas that produces and normalizes racial inequities...Racial inequity is when two or more racial groups are not standing on approximately equal footing...A racist policy is any measure that produces or sustains inequity between racial groups...Racism itself is institutional, structural and systemic..."

It can feel overwhelming and even paralyzing trying to figure out what to do. While it is not a checklist, because this is ongoing work, one approach is the ARC of Racial Justice, created by Jemar Tisby. It is a useful framework to utilize.

The A is for Awareness. Tisby says, "To increase your capacity to fight your own complicity in racism, you can start by increasing your awareness of the issues and people involved." In addition to reading, he provides some other examples of how to do this: "Diversify your social media feed by following racial and ethnic minorities..." and "Access websites and podcasts (on a variety of topics, not just racial ones), created by racial and ethnic minorities."

The R is for Relationships. Tisby says, "The long history of racial segregation in this country coupled with the tendency to associate with those most like ourselves has left all of us in mostly homogeneous social networks." According to Tisby, one can "find new places to hang out" or "join a sport, club or activity with people who are different." Keep in mind that "you may have to engineer these opportunities, but they can lead to organic friendships that cross traditional lines of social division." It is critical to examine the power dynamics that may be at play in our relationships. Are we operating from a level playing field, as peers or is the White person operating from a place of power and privilege as the helper and rescuer?

The C is for Commitment. Tisby says, "Commitment to the ARC model requires a total shift in disposition so that antiracist activity is a way of life, not simply a topic to which you give occasional and superficial attention." Some action steps towards developing a lifelong commitment include, "create something that speaks to racial justice," "join an organization that advocates for racial justice..." and "speak with candidates about their views of racial justice and the policies they advocate."

FROM THE BOOKKEEPER

September Financial Report

The September reports, they finally are in balance!

I had requested ABEC to transfer funds to the church's BMO Harris account from both the Capital Reserve and Designated Accts there in September (one early in September and the other late in September) to help with cash flow, but neither were received during September. At this point the ABEC Capital Reserve still owes the budget \$3,938.90, plus an additional \$9,761.59 to bring the 18620 Repairs & Maintenance down to the budgeted amount of \$5,000.and leave only \$5,353.63 in the Uncommitted Capital Reserve. If and when we receive that transfer, the budget will have a slight surplus to date, but the year-to-date budget deficit is \$5,543.24.

I did transfer all the funds designated in the budget to 10006 Transfer Other Funds, otherwise the deficit would have been even larger. Budget lines newly exceeding their annual budget in September include 17177 Pastor - Hospitality, 17223 Bookkeeper, and 18909 Fire Extinguisher Testing.

Board of Outreach Support

Milwaukee Christian Center

In each Visitor your Board of Christian Outreach would like to report on one of the groups we support through the Outreach Budget.

The Milwaukee Christian Center is an ABC ministry whose mission is to build strong neighborhoods. The areas of focus are housing, youth development, older adults, food security and neighborhood revitalization.

Milwaukee Christian Center recently reported they are in full swing for the fall. They will have before and after school programs at multiple sites across Milwaukee. Their art projects will focus on Joan Miro, Catalan painter and sculptor. MCC also sponsors a Violence Free Zone program that mentors students to decrease disruptive behavior and develop life skills.

Youth are harvesting produce from the Growing Connections Youth Development Garden, a summer project guided by student interns from UW Extension. MCC has also announced a new Youth Build site.

American Baptist Women of Wisconsin had been assigned Milwaukee Christian Center as the AB Women's project. For many years the women in our church supported Milwaukee Christian Center with items we purchased from a list of clothes, art supplies, books, sports equipment, and other requests. When MCC moved to their new building First Baptist church members took a bus trip to tour and learn about their programs. We decided to purchase window coverings for their education room to make it easier to see projected information.

Clothes Dryers and Energy Use

It's hard to write something about clothes dryers in the 21st century without thinking about the beginning of clothes drying (and washing). Just a quick Google search and I found this statement:

"After boiling, 'blueing', starching, and rinsing, the washing had to be dried. In the winter, or in wet weather, the washing had to be dried indoors. Lines were strung across the kitchen and the kitchen fire left quite high so that the washing dried through the night." From the collections of Bruce Castle Museum (Haringey Archive and Museum Service)

My purpose for the Green Team on the subject is to just give a couple of tips on cloths drying:

- Your dryer is responsible for about 6% of home energy use. Add dryer balls to your next load (especially those made of wool). This will reduce drying time by creating space between your clothes, reducing drying time by 25%.
- Air drying is the best choice for climate issues. If you don't have the luxury of outdoors, clothesline, consider using drying racks or hanging clothes inside. It's not only better for the climate, but easier on your clothes.
- Dry towels and heavier cottons in a separate load from lighter-weight clothes.
- Don't over-dry your clothes. If your machine has a moisture sensor, use it.
- Clean the lint filter in the dryer after every load to improve air circulation.
- Use the cool-down cycle to allow the clothes to finish drying with the residual heat in the dryer.
- Periodically inspect your dryer vent to ensure it is not blocked. This will save energy and may prevent a fire.
 Manufacturers recommend using rigid venting material. Plastic vents may collapse and cause blockages.

Good to Know:

Purchasing new laundry equipment Look for the <u>ENERGY STAR®</u> label when buying washers and dryers.

- ENERGY STAR® washers clean clothes using 40% less energy than standard washers. Most full-sized ENERGY STAR® washers use 18 to 25 gallons of water per load, compared to the 40 gallons used by a standard machine.
- ENERGY STAR® models also spin the clothes more effectively, resulting in less drying time.
- Consider switching from electric to natural gas when replacing your water heater or clothes dryer.


