

Fasting From Whiteness: A Lenten Journey



This month we will begin observing the season of Lent—the period of 40 days during which Christians remember the events leading up to and including the death of Jesus. Symbolizing the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness fasting and enduring temptation before beginning his public ministry, this has become for many Christians a time of introspection, repentance, and self-denial. Common practices during Lent include commitment to new spiritual disciplines, fasting, and giving something up.

What more perfect time is there than Lent to reflect on the ways we, as white individuals and congregations, have been complicit in white supremacy, to repent of our participation in the sin of racism, and to fast from our whiteness. During Lent, we will engage in the spiritual practice of fasting from whiteness by abstaining from music and liturgies written or composed by white people in our weekly worship services.

Instead, worship will center the work of BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color) composers, writers, authors, liturgists, artists, and theologians. We will draw on music from around the world, including Korean folk music, South African melodies, Native American hymns, African American Spirituals, and more. Our weekly themes will draw heavily from the work of womanist theologian and Hebrew Bible scholar Rev. Dr. Wilda Gafney.

The season of Lent may begin with grief and move toward death, but it ultimately ends in the great celebration of resurrection at Easter. This Lenten series is an invitation to grieve our past, repent of our actions, and reimagine a church that is intentionally inclusive in all we do. It is a challenge to fast from our whiteness to create space for underrepresented and marginalized voices. This is the difficult and often painful internal work of self-reflection we must do to create a culture of full inclusion in our congregation. This is the work of building a Beloved Community. This is the work of resurrection, of hope, of revitalization.

- Mom is newly certified for computer skills related to office work.
- New job that will evolve to full-time and meet budget goals!
- The family flower garden brightened our corner of the block.
- Regular meetings with resource contacts.

Yearly roundup for our family of seven:

- Moving forward towards goals of excellent school achievement, sustainable income, and debt reduction
- School
 - Four youngest love it!
 - Two high schoolers- not so much love, but they are persisting.
 - School reports show the youngest, born at Catalyst, meeting grade level expectations in all subjects.
 - All progressing academically, with numerous teacher comments such as "He is a joy to have in class," or "I have seen tremendous growth..."

- Overcoming four earlier (and cut short) attempts, the mom passed all test requirements and received a license as a Certified Nursing Assistant.

Volunteer Drivers Needed to Help Immigrants

Since 2019, the Dane Sanctuary Coalition has provided a rides program that has been deeply appreciated by immigrants, their attorneys, and referring agencies.

Volunteers are transporting immigrants from the Madison area to the US Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) offices in Milwaukee, Waukegan, IL, and Chicago, as well as to the US Immigration Court in Chicago. The demand for these rides is high so more volunteer drivers are needed.

Immigrants have scheduled appointments typically to provide biometrics data (e.g., fingerprints, photos, etc.), security checks, asylum interviews, deportation court hearings, citizenship interviews, and meetings with immigration attorneys. It is mandatory that they attend their appointments; in some cases, failure to do so can put the immigrant at increased risk for deportation.

The round-trip rides to Milwaukee or Waukegan generally are completed within six to eight hours. The rides to and from Chicago take a full day. The Dane Sanctuary Coalition is able to provide a \$25 reimbursement for rides to Milwaukee or Waukegan, and a \$65 (plus parking) reimbursement for rides to Chicago.

Volunteer drivers only commit to one ride at a time based on their availability and willingness to provide a particular ride.

Bert Newton Adams 1932 - 2024

Bert Newton Adams, age 91, of Madison, WI, died on Saturday, January 6, 2024, at Agrace Hospice Residence in Fitchburg.

Bert earned a B.A. in Music from William Jewell College, a Th.M. from Southern Seminary, and a Ph.D. in Sociology from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. After a post-doctoral fellowship at UNC, from 1970-72 Bert served as a senior lecturer and researcher in Kampala, Uganda. His book, "An American Family in Amin's Uganda," chronicles the experiences he and his family had. He joined the Sociology faculty of University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1965. For nearly 50 years he taught courses on Social Theory and lecture classes on Marriage and the Family, reaching some 20,000 UW students. Bert published 20 academic books. He received numerous research grants and professional awards and was a Fellow and President of the National Council on Family Relations. Dr. Adams conducted sociological research in Kenya, Uganda, India, Canada, and Great Britain, and gave academic lectures in Sweden, Estonia, Bangladesh, and Korea. Bert was widely known for his amazing baritone voice. His performing career spanned 50plus years, including more than 30 lead roles with Madison Opera, singing at his beloved church (First Baptist, Madison) and for senior living communities including Oakwood Village where he resided.

FROM THE FBC BOOKKEEPER

December Financial Report

(Year End)

The Acct Balance report has an out of balance of \$1.20 (again). The Operating Fund Assets Totals minus the Operating Fund Liabilities is \$3,463.92 versus the \$3,465.12 shown in the Budget report. I will try to rectify this in January. The \$37.27 as shown as 55512 Communion in Oper Fund is a liability but it is also payable to the Operating Fund to pay for the 55523 Utilities bill that was charged to the Pastor's credit card.)

The 4th quarter income on our ABEC accounts has not been received--it is not posted online and my phone calls to their office voice mail have not been returned. That will result in slightly more income in each of those accounts in 2024.

The good news is we ended the year with a \$3,465.12 surplus because of receipt of memorial funds designated for the Capital Reserve, which paid off the overage in the 18620 Repairs and Maintenance spending (a total of \$20,089.79 was transferred from 41601 Uncommitted Capital Reserves (plus the designated memorial funds) to 18620 Repairs and Maintenance). The only Budget accounts that went over their annual budget for the first time in December are 18502 Buildings & Operations Expense (i.e., cleaning supplies & batteries), 18803 Electric, and 18914 Payroll Service.

There was a significant increase in the 503 Vanguard Grp-Communion resulting in a positive balance in the 55603 Gibson Memorial Earnings this quarter. The Endowment Fund also had a significant increase this quarter, but the 303 Endownmt-Uncomm Earnings still has a large deficit.

THE GREEN CORNER

Madison Schools Reducing Food Waste

At a recent First Baptist Green Team meeting I learned that some of the Madison Schools are working with the nonprofit Sustain Dane organization to turn food waste into usable compost. This all started through Sustain Dane using a \$20,000 grant from Virent to help educate students about recycling and sustainability. Virent, a company located in Madison, is working to commercialize its BioForming® technology to create the fuels and chemicals the world demands from a wide range of naturally occurring, renewable resources.

Sustain Dane has other programs concerning food waste and composting: The Farmers' Market Food Scrap Collection, and a Restaurant Sustainability Network.

Food waste comprises about one-third of the materials being sent to the Dane County Landfill. To reduce this amount of food waste, Dane County plans to establish a compost facility at the Sustainability Campus by 2026. This is a first step towards designing and building a digester facility in the future.

With less than ten years of landfill space remaining at Dane County Rodefeld Landfill, our community has an opportunity to plan for our changing waste stream and purposefully set the foundation to advance us towards a circular economy.

Green Team Update

The Green Team is working on scheduling a tour of the Madison Metropolitan Sewerage District. Soon we will have available dates and will start a sign-up sheet. The Green Team is also considering scheduling another tour at the Dane County Landfill this summer.
